## BIRD WALK AT CAVE CREEK RECREATIONAL PARK

DATE: March 31<sup>st</sup>, 2018

CONDITIONS: 81 degrees F at 8:35 AM: partly cloudy skies and no breeze. Our walk finished at 10:15 AM under partly cloudy skies and a warm 92 degrees F. Dry conditions continue in this Upper Sonoran Desert habitat and the flower bloom was minimal when compared to past years. Brittlebush, milkweed were in bloom and Hedgehog Cactus were putting out some magenta blooms. Palo Verde trees were beginning to flower as was Velvet Mesquite. Water sources were hard to come by for the resident birds.

COMMENTS: The trail taken was from the Nature Center to the Overton Trail, east across Tonalite Avenue into the parking lot where the Slate Trailhead was located, then the group returned by major roads to the Nature Center. Highlights were the looks at Black-throated Sparrows and Canyon Towhees, Common Ravens soaring with the thermals in the distance above the mountains, the American Kestrel, and the Costa's Hummingbird and singing Lucy's Warbler at the Nature Center.
