Riparian Preserve at Water Ranch (Gilbert), November 26, 2014

Our walk began at 8:30 am under clear skies, no breeze, and temperature 61 degrees; at conclusion the temperature was 72 degrees. Highlights of the trip were the Rosy-faced Lovebirds and the large number of waterfowl constantly coming in for landings and then taking off, especially the pintails.

The 8 participants - Joe Emmons, Martha Emmons, Vera Markham, Lois Lorenz, Joyce Anastasi, Joy Dolhanczyk, Joe Ford, and Caleb Strand (guide) – observed the following 72 species: Canada Goose, American Widgeon, Mallard, Cinnamon Teal, Northern Shoveler, Northern Pintail, Green-winged Teal, Redhead, Ring-necked Duck, Lesser Scaup, Ruddy Duck, Ring-necked Pheasant, Gambel's quail, Pied-billed Grebe, Swan Goose, Neotropic Cormorant,



Great Blue Heron, Great Egret, Snowy Egret, Green Heron, White-faced Ibis, Turkey Vulture, Osprey, Northern Harrier, Cooper's Hawk, Harris's Hawk, Red-tailed Hawk, American Kestrel, Peregrine Falcon, American Coot, Killdeer, Black-necked Stilt, Greater Yellowlegs, Least Sandpiper, Longbilled Dowitcher, Wilson's Snipe, Rock Pigeon, Eurasian Collared-Dove, Mourning Dove, Inca Dove, Rosy-faced Lovebird, Greater Roadrunner, Anna's Hummingbird, Gila Woodpecker, Ladder-backed

Woodpecker, Black Phoebe, Say's Phoebe, Northern Rough-winged Swallow, Verdin, Marsh Wren, House Wren, Ruby-crowned Kinglet, Hermit Thrush, American Robin, Northern Mockingbird, Curve-billed Thrasher, European Starling, American Pipit, Orange-crowned Warbler, Yellow Warbler, Yellow-rumped Warbler, Common Yellowthroat, Spotted Towhee, Abert's Towhee, Song Sparrow, Lincoln's Sparrow, White-crowned Sparrow, Dark-eyed Junco, Red-winged Blackbird, Great-tailed Grackle, House Finch, Lesser Goldfinch, and House Sparrow. One unusual duck appeared to be a wood duck/mallard hybrid.
