BIRD WALK AT ESTRELLA MT. REGIONAL PARK

September 12, 2015

CONDITIONS: Partly cloudy, both high cirrocumulus, cirrus, alto-cumulus: Temperature 85 F at start, 101 F at conclusion: humidity high 45%, little to no breeze: length 1.5 miles

The normal trail was taken through the Mesquite Bosque, east park area, Blue Gum Forest, desert scrub, then across to the riparian area along the Gila River bed (no water present) and to the mitigated east lakes. In contrast to last year when the river was bank full due to a recent rain event of some 3+ inches, this year the river was totally dry until we reached the lakes at the far east end of our trail. Certainly this presented some difficult conditions were water seeking birds as well as food sources. The park area had been experiencing some irrigation, thus the bird presence was a more normal situation. The humidity level was also high and coupled with high temperatures the hiking conditions on this day were not the most ideal and our group was diminished by the time we concluded at 9:30 AM after a 2 hour observing time. A crosscountry meet was in process, therefore some birds were probably flushed from the area.

HIGHLIGHTS: A four thrasher day, as Bendire's was seen for the first time on an SAS Bird Walk, and a very cooperative Crissal Thrasher perched up nicely:: raptors thermalling towards the end of the hike, Turkey Vultures, Cooper's Hawk, and Northern Harrier all at one time.
