
## ESTRELLA MOUNTAINS REGIONAL PARK BIRDWALK 12 14 19

CONDITIONS: Beginning—51 degrees F, 15% sky cover with cirrus and altocumulus, no breeze. Finish:--- 68 degrees F, 5% sky cover with cirrus and cirrostratus, 0-2 mph breeze from the SW.

TIME AND ROUTE: 3 hours and approximately 3 miles. The walk began with some observations around the Nature Center, then moved to the Mesquite Bosque on the east side of the park, trekked through the Blue Gum Grove, across the grassy area and the desert scrub, and finally ventured on the Gila River Trail to the east ponds.

COMMENTS: We were favored with a river with flowing water, after a three month period without this accommodation. However, since this body of water had only been in place in the last two weeks, adaptation to the new conditions had not encouraged many shore birds or duck types to begin to settle in. We did sight 5 raptor species and some grand color with the Vermilion Flycatchers and the Rednaped Sapsucker. Yellow-rumped Warblers seemed to show up everywhere and Northern Roughwinged Swallows dominated the overhead air waves. We had a special visit on the river from a Lesser Scaup male.
