## ESTRELLA MT. REGIONAL PARK BIRDWALK 2 11 23

CONDITIONS: At 8 AM skies were cloudy to 95 percent with altocumulus, cumulus, and altostratus the dominant cloud types, temperature at 50 degrees F and a breeze from the east at 6-7 mph.:: walk conclusion at 10 AM, cloudy skies at 80 % cover, cumulus, cirrocumulus, cirrus, and alto cumulus dominating and a brisk breeze from the east, 7-8 mph.

ROUTE: The walk was abbreviated this trip due to potential danger from hunters in the area of the ponds on the east side of Vineyard Avenue. Numerous repetitive discharges from firearms were in that area. Thus the stroll through the Mesquite Bosque, Blue Gum Grove. Irrigated grass areas, the median on the north side of the Navy Area and the desert scrub region north of the parking lot occupied most of our time. Observations at the Nature Center earlier also produced some good looks. Some of our group did make the trip across Vineyard and along the south riparian trail adjacent to the Gila River and those observations are added to this report.

COMMENTS: The day arrived with a grand sunrise that painted the clouds with tinges of orange and pink. And there were a lot of clouds along with a pretty good breeze from the east. Color was provided by the Vermilion Flycatchers and a Red-naped Sapsucker. Thrushes were represented by American Robins and a small group of Western Bluebirds. Four woodpecker species were seen and an Eurasian Collared Dove graced the airwaves with a continuous song that just seemed to go on and on.
