CONDITIONS: Ideal. At 6:30 AM the temperature was 67 degrees F, with clear skies sprinkled with a few cirrus clouds and a 0-2 mph breeze from the east:: at the walk conclusion, 9 AM, the temperature was 82 degrees F, a few more cirrus clouds and a breeze again from the east at 1-2 mph.

COMMENTS: The fantastic spring bloom was on the decline, but still lots of flowers, including several Hedgehog Cactus and occasionally a Teddy Bear Cholla offering creamy white flowers. The stately Saguaros were just beginning to have the white flowers begin to appear. In two weeks the saguaro spires will be capped with the many blossoms to attract nectar seeking insects and birds. Cactus Wrens ruled the air waves and Canyon Wrens offered their descending calls from the rocky slopes. We did have a Hooded Oriole and Say's Phoebe fledglings were

hanging around the entrance to the library. Some rock forms brought images to mind of camels and vultures and fur seals. A highlight was the Great Horned Owl.
